PREOPERATIVE WARNING CONCERNING MEDICATIONS AND BLEEDING

Many medicines that you may be routinely taking can cause bleeding at the time of surgery. This is especially true of ASPIRIN AND ASPIRIN CONTAINING PRODUCTS.

Indeed, patients are often instructed to take one or two aspirin a day by their regular physician to deliberately "thin" their blood. This effect is usually reduced if the aspirin is stopped **TWO WEEKS** before the planned surgery.

Remember, all aspirin is the same when it comes to this blood thinning effect. The only pain medication allowed is Tylenol.

Recently, non-prescription forms of IBUPROFEN which can also thin your blood have become available. These include: Advil and Nuprin. Many anti-arthritis medicines including MOTRIN, BUTAZOLIDIN, TOLECTIN and INDOCIN can also thin your blood.

All the medications listed below can thin your blood and should be discontinued **TWO WEEKS** before and for **TWO WEEKS** after surgery. Please tell the doctor if you are taking any of these medicines:

You may take your heart or blood pressure medications the morning of your surgery with a small sip of water.
